### 2001 CONVENTION KEYNOTE SPEAKER

#### DR. JUDITH FAVELL

Dr. Judith Favell received her Ph.D. from the University of Kansas in 1970. Throughout her career as a researcher, clinician, and administrator, she has specialized in the analysis and treatment of severe behavior problems such as self-injury and aggression in individuals with developmental disabilities. Her work has focused on environmental, organizational, and regulatory issues that impact services and treatment for such people and problems. She has authored numerous articles (including the original research on restraint as positive reinforcement), many chapters, and two books. She has also served as an officer in all major organizations in her field, for example as President of ABA, President of APA's Division 33 (mental retardation), and Representative at Large for AABT and APA. Dr. Favell is currently CEO of AdvoServ, a private network of programs spanning several states and serving individuals with extraordinary behavioral challenges.
